Sentencing in other countries is at once familiar and exotic. This issue of *FSR* presents a variety of sentencing snapshots from foreign lands. As further demonstrated by our most recent issue on California sentencing, we believe that understanding other sentencing systems can help those who care about their own systems think outside the box. No country will—or should—blindly follow the sentencing policies of its neighbors in what some call the global village. However, the articles in this issue can facilitate neighborly conversations about what makes sense for sentencing and why.

In the next issue, *FSR* continues its exploration of U.S. federal sentencing five years after *Booker* by reproducing remarks from a symposium featuring Sentencing Commission Chair Chief Judge William K. Sessions III, Commission ex officio member Jonathan Wroblewski (from the Department of Justice), former judge (and now professor) Paul Cassell, and several other academics.

Looking ahead to volume 23, *FSR* is preparing to tackle questions of life without parole in the wake of the Supreme Court's resolution of two juvenile life without parole Eighth Amendment cases.



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
